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# Tips for a Safe Harvest

Harvest season brings hard work and can be an exhausting, but rushing the job to save time can be extremely dangerous (even deadly!) when working near overhead power lines. We urge farm operators and workers to keep the following safety tips in mind:



Use care when operating large machinery near power lines.



Inspect the height of equipment to determine clearance.



Always keep equipment at least 10 feet away (in all directions) from power lines.



Remember to lower extensions when moving loads.



If a power line is sagging or looks to be dangerously low, please call us immediately.

## **Growing Reliability Threats**

American families and businesses expect the lights to stay on at a cost they can afford. But that's no longer a guarantee. Nine states saw rolling blackouts last December as the demand for electricity exceeded available supply.

This is no longer a theoretical conversation. And unless policymakers change course, it's going to get worse.

#### Warnings and challenges mount

In May, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) proposed a rule to regulate power plant emissions. This proposal will further strain America's electric grid and undermine decades of work to reliably keep the lights on across the nation. It's just the latest instance of EPA failing to prioritize reliable electricity as a fundamental expectation of American consumers.

It shouldn't have to be this way. When you find yourself in a hole, the first thing to do is stop digging. But instead of putting down the shovel, EPA wants to bring in an excavator.

But don't just take my word for it. Warnings about the threat of reliability challenges have snowballed in recent months. The 2023 North American Electric Reliability Corporation (NERC) summer reliability assessment recently highlighted that more of the country is at risk of blackouts than last year. NERC says that the EPA proposal will accelerate the reliability challenges.

In May, several Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) leaders warned the U.S. Senate about threats to reliable electricity. In March, Manu Asthana, who is the CEO of PJM Interconnection - a regional transmission organization that coordinates the movement of wholesale electricity in 13 states - said that the regional transmission organization needed to slow the pace of generation retirements to avoid reliability problems by the end of the decade.

WIPCO, through its generation and transmission cooperative Northwest Iowa Power Cooperative (NIPCO), is a member of Basin Electric Power Cooperative's power supply system. This regional wholesale power supply cooperative has nearly 7,000 megawatts of generating capacity and 2,500 miles of high-voltage transmission lines - all managed with you, the member-owner, in mind.

This summer, WIPCO members joined members from thirteen other western and north central Iowa electric cooperatives on a three-day excursion through the Dakotas to learn about where their electricity comes from and have some fun along the journey.

OAHE POWER PLANT AND DAM
On the first electric-generation
stop of the three-day tour, guests
visited Pierre, South Dakota,
to learn about hydroelectric
generation and the innovative
rolled-earth dam creating Lake
Oahe, the fourth largest U.S.
reservoir.

ANTELOPE VALLEY STATION
The tour encompassed a model room introduction and a guided walk through the power plant featuring visits to the turbine deck, control room, boiler, and 17th-floor observation deck.

THE COTEAU PROPERTIES
COMPANY FREEDOM MINE
Tour guests learned how lignite
coal is produced at a surface mine
and how the land is returned to
its original state. A guided drivethrough tour took members
through active mining areas where
they witnessed giant earthmoving
equipment in action.

The trip also offered insight into operations at GREAT PLAINS SYNFUELS PLANT and how coal can be refined into natural gas and a variety of other products.

## Growing Reliability Threats - Continued from Page 1

#### Voicing reliability concerns

America has a reliability problem. With the help of co-op leaders across the nation, the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association has been a leading voice in sounding the alarm on reliability. Today's energy decisions will determine if there are sufficient resources to keep the lights on tomorrow. Five issues are impacting the reliable delivery of electricity across the nation.

- 1. Increasing demand for electricity as other sectors of the economy are electrified.
- 2. Decreasing electricity supply due to the disorderly retirement and insufficient replacement of existing generation.
- 3. Permitting delays that prevent new electric infrastructure from being built and connected to the grid.
- 4. Supply chain challenges.
- 5. Problems with natural gas availability.

#### Commitment to member-consumers

None of these challenges will be easy to address, but we can start by asking ourselves these questions:

- Is this what American is supposed to be?
- Should the threat of rolling blackouts be a permanent facet of U.S. energy policy?

The answer to both of those questions is a resounding no for electric co-ops and the communities we serve.

The long-term solution requires policymakers and regulators to recognize the need for time, technology development and new transmission infrastructure. These are the essential ingredients for an energy future that prioritizes reliable electricity for all consumers, including the 42 million Americans served by electric cooperatives.

## ATTENTION: RESIDENTIAL CUSTOMERS **NEED HELP WITH YOUR HEATING BILL?**

The 2023-2024 Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) has been established to help qualifying low-income lowa homeowners and renters pay for a portion of their primary heating costs for the winter heating season.

The assistance is based on household income, household size, type of fuel, and type of housing.

#### WHEN TO APPLY:

- Elderly (60 & over) and/or disabled: October 1, 2023 to April 30, 2024
- All other households: November 1, 2023 to April 30, 2024

#### WHAT TO TAKE:

- Proof of Income (for all household members age 18 and over) Depending upon your household income type, income
- **Proof of Social Security Numbers for all household** members (documentation required)
- Most recent heat bill
- Most recent electric bill

#### **WAGE EARNERS:**

Please bring copies of your check stubs for the 30-day period preceding the date of application, or a copy of your most recent federal income tax return.

#### FIXED INCOME:

This income may include: Social Security Benefits, Supplemental Security Income, Veteran's Assistance, Unemployment Insurance, and pensions. Please bring copies of your check stubs from the previous 30 days.

If you receive alimony or child support, it will also need to be verified. Additional income not listed here may be required.

## **RECare - Members Helping Members**

Your Rural Electric Cooperative has always extended a helping hand to those needing it. In response to actions by the Iowa General Assembly, your REC has established RECare, a program of Members helping Members.

RECare will provide funds to be distributed by local community action agencies to help pay winter heating bills and to assist in weatherization of homes of low-income consumers.

You may make a one-time contribution or you may make a monthly pledge that will be automatically added onto your monthly electric bill. You may also make your contribution part of a matching fund, if there is one established. Your contribution is tax deductible. Even a dollar a month pledge will help others!
