WIPCO Offers Scholarship Opportunities

Western Iowa Power Cooperative (WIPCO) in conjunction with Basin Electric Power Cooperative (BEPC) will be awarding six scholarships for the 2024-2025 school year. This program, now in its 34th year, recognizes and encourages academic and community achievements of students whose parents are WIPCO members.

BEPC will award one \$1,000 scholarship and WIPCO will award one \$1,000 and four \$500 scholarships. Two of the \$500 scholarships will be designated specifically for students enrolling in vocational and/or technical schools.

The scholarship must be used for educational costs, and the student must enter college in the fall of the school year for which the scholarship is given. Scholarships will be awarded without regard to other awards, loans, or financial assistance the applicant may have obtained. Previous scholarship award winners are not eligible.

A selection committee will choose the recipients of the scholarships. The selection committee's decisions are final. Awards are based on the following criteria: grade point average, work experience, participation in school and community activities, a personal statement of career goals, and a written recommendation by a third party. We ask that if the student has taken a college entrance exam (ACT and/or SAT), that score be included with their application materials. Should a student plan to attend a college that does not require ACT/SAT, please indicate that on the application form.

Applicant must be a US citizen and the dependent of a WIPCO member. Applicant must be a student who is enrolled or planning to enroll in a full-time undergraduate or graduate course of study at an accredited, two-year or four-year college, university, or vocational/technical school.

Applications must be received at a WIPCO location (Denison or Onawa) no later than February 9th, 2024.

The holiday season is a great time to reflect on the year that was and the opportunities that the new year will bring. In that spirit, let's take a look at 2023 and the day-to-day operations completed by WIPCO during the year in a couple of different areas.

Line Construction – Building new line and rebuilding old line is a core function for any rural electric cooperative such as WIPCO. Aging infrastructure can have an adverse impact on electric service reliability, so electric cooperatives work through plans over the course of many years to improve our systems in a reasonable and responsible manner. Many new services are also installed each year as new homes, farms, and businesses are built or expanded on WIPCO lines.

In 2023 to date, WIPCO has completed 175 work orders, ranging from simple new service installations to multi-mile rebuild projects. Many projects involved installation of overhead line, but over 16 new miles of underground line have also been installed on our system year-to-date. When feasible, underground line can remove many variables that can cause outages, particularly those caused by weather.

Taken together, these construction projects improve WIPCO's electric system and the vast array of components that make up our portion of the electric grid. Our primary goal has always been, and continues to be, to keep the power on for you, our members. These improvements to our system help us to continue to do just that, as efficiently as possible.

Electrical & Wiring – One of our relatively unique offerings at WIPCO is our fullservice electrician team. Our electricians are certified for just about any job our members could have a need for, from wiring, lighting, and water heater installations to HVAC, geothermal, or solar work.

In 2023 to date, WIPCO electricians have completed 725 projects specifically for our members, and hundreds more to serve our cooperative as a whole (such as joint projects with our line crews, or installation of new load management equipment to help our entire membership save money on the power WIPCO purchases and distributes). The work we complete for our members is very diverse and includes in-home HVAC installations, wiring of irrigation pivots, repairs and replacements of existing equipment, and countless other areas. The bottom line is that if you can think of something you need done by an electrician, our team can likely be a resource for you. If you have an electrical or wiring project coming up, we would encourage you to reach out to us for an estimate!

As we look ahead to 2024, we continue to look into new and meaningful ways we can serve you more effectively, from updated construction plans to use of new technologies – all with the goal of improving our reliability and efficiency as your trusted energy provider.

We are always grateful for our members and the opportunity to serve you. From our cooperative family to yours, we wish you Happy Holidays, Merry Christmas, and a Happy New Year!

Electric cooperatives power lowa's economic growth By Chuck Soderberg, Executive Vice President and General Manager of the Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives

You depend on your local electric cooperative to power your life every day, but did you know that your co-op also powers economic growth in your region?

Earlier this year, the Iowa Association of Electric Cooperatives commissioned an economic impact study through Goss & Associates of Omaha to confirm what we've long known about our association members: Iowa's locally owned electric co-ops contribute greatly to the state's economy.

For the five years ending in 2021, the study found that lowa electric co-ops generated a total impact on the state of \$4.8 billion, produced \$688 million in wages and salaries, directly supported 1,961 jobs, generated self-employment income of \$79.5 million and paid \$144.7 million in state and local taxes.

Powering lives and empowering communities are core to our cooperative mission. This economic analysis is useful as we talk with legislators, policymakers and other decision-makers about how electric cooperatives invest in rural lowa. For over 80 years, electric co-ops have maintained reliable and affordable electric service, provided stable career opportunities and paid taxes which have vast ripple effects throughout the regions we serve.

Not only have electric co-ops' economic impacts been historically significant, but the study also concludes that coops have assisted local and state organizations in the retention, attraction and expansion of businesses in the state. Separate from their spending impacts, electric cooperatives invest in efforts to attract and retain jobs and investment within their communities. 60-01-26037

In addition to their daily duty of providing safe, reliable and affordable power, the study found that lowa electric cooperatives had an impact of \$14.7 billion in economic development projects between 2018 and 2022, supporting 7,366 jobs (retained, attracted or expanded) during that same time period.

Your electric cooperative has no doubt supported many economic development initiatives over the decades by serving as an intermediary for USDA revolving loan funds, among other programs and projects. For example, several lowa electric co-ops have been instrumental in developing industrial speculative buildings to accommodate local business expansion or to attract new businesses and jobs to the community. Iowa's electric cooperatives also give generously to local charitable causes and support youth education initiatives, which we often write about in the pages of this magazine.

You should be proud of your local electric co-op's contributions to Iowa's economy. As a member-owned and locally governed entity, your electric co-op is more than a service provider; it's a major economic engine of progress for your community.

Holiday Savings

5 Ways to Safeguard your Home this Winter

As the temperatures drop and the days grow shorter, there's a natural inclination to create a warm and cozy haven at home. Unfortunately, as we see increased use of heating equipment, candles and electrical items, the number of home fires tends to increase during winter months.

Here are five ways you can safeguard your home for the winter season.

1. Ensure carbon monoxide and smoke detectors are working properly. If your detectors are battery-operated, replace the batteries annually. Test the detectors once a month and give them a good dusting to ensure the sensors are clear of dirt and debris.

2. Inspect electrical cords. We depend on more cords during winter, whether for holiday lighting, extension cords or portable heaters. Before using any corded items, double check to make sure cords aren't frayed or cracked. If you use portable space heaters, remember to keep them at least 3 feet away from flammable items. Use models that include an auto shut-off feature and overheat protection. Space heaters can take a toll on your energy bills. Use them efficiently (to heat smaller spaces) and safely. Never plug a space heater into a power strip. Speaking of power strips...

3. Avoid overloading electrical outlets and power strips. When overloaded with electrical items, outlets and power strips can overheat and catch fire. If you use power strips for multiple devices, make sure the strip can handle the electrical load. For a safer bet, look for power strips that include surge protection.

4. Clean the fireplace to improve safety and efficiency. There's nothing better than a warm fire on a chilly night, but it's important to maintain your fireplace for safety. As wood burns, a sticky substance known as creosote builds up in the chimney. When creosote buildup becomes too thick, a chimney fire can ignite. The chimney should be cleaned at least once a year to reduce fire risks. Regular cleaning also improves air flow and limits the amount of carbon monoxide that seeps indoors.

5. Practice safety in the kitchen. As we spend more time in the kitchen during the holiday season, be mindful of potential fire hazards. Never leave food that's cooking on the stove-top unattended. Clean and remove spilled foods from cooking surfaces and be mindful of where you place flammable items like dish towels.

2023-2024 Iowa Home Energy Assistance Program

ATTENTION: RESIDENTIAL CUSTOMERS NEED HELP WITH YOUR HEATING BILL?

The 2022-2023 Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) has been established to help qualifying low-income lowa homeowners and renters pay for a portion of their primary heating costs for the winter heating season.

The assistance is based on household income, household size, type of fuel, and type of housing.

WHEN TO APPLY:

- Elderly (60 & over) and/or disabled: October 1, 2022 to April 30, 2023
- All other households: November 1, 2022 to April 30, 2023

WHAT TO TAKE:

- Proof of Income (for all household members age 18 and over) Depending upon your household income type, income documentation from the past 30 days, the last 12 months, or Please bring copies of your check stubs from the previous 30 days. last calendar year, whichever is easier or more beneficial for SELF-EMPLOYED/FARMERS: you.
- Proof of Social Security Numbers for all household members (documentation required)
- Most recent heat bill
- Most recent electric bill

RECare - Members Helping Members

WIPCO maintains an RECare program facilitating assistance for members in need through winter heating bill payments and home weatherization via local community action agencies. Donations, which are tax-deductible, can be made as one-time contributions, monthly pledges added to electric bills, or as part of a matching fund initiative. Even small pledges like a dollar per month can make a significant difference.
